Dear Ms. Aguilar:

You ask whether certain information is subject to required public disclosure under the Public Information Act (the "Act"), chapter 552 of the Government Code. Your request was assigned ID# 357887.

The Corpus Christi Police Department (the "department") received a request for incident report number 02-045654. You claim the submitted incident report is excepted from disclosure under section 552.101 of the Government Code. We have considered the exception you claim and reviewed the submitted information.

Section 552.101 of the Government Code excepts from disclosure "information considered to be confidential by law, either constitutional, statutory, or by judicial decision." Gov't Code § 552.101. This exception encompasses information protected by other statutes, such as section 261.201 of the Family Code, which provides in relevant part:

(a) [T]he following information is confidential, is not subject to public release under [the Act], and may be disclosed only for purposes consistent with this code and applicable federal or state law or under rules adopted by an investigating agency:

(1) a report of alleged or suspected abuse or neglect made under this chapter and the identity of the person making the report; and

(2) except as otherwise provided in this section, the files, reports, records, communications, audiotapes, videotapes, and working papers used or developed in an investigation under this chapter or in providing services as a result of an investigation.

...

(k) Notwithstanding Subsection (a), an investigating agency . . . on request, shall provide to the parent, managing conservator, or other legal representative of a child who is the subject of reported abuse or neglect, or to the child if the child is at least 18 years of age, information concerning the reported abuse or neglect that would otherwise be confidential under this section. The investigating agency shall withhold information under this subsection if the parent, managing conservator, or other legal representative of the child requesting the information is alleged to have committed the abuse or neglect.

(l) Before a child or a parent, managing conservator, or other legal representative of a child may inspect or copy a record or file concerning the child under Subsection (k), the custodian of the record or file must redact:

(1) any personally identifiable information about a victim or witness under 18 years of age unless that victim or witness is:

(A) the child who is the subject of the report; or

(B) another child of the parent, managing conservator, or other legal representative requesting the information;

(2) any information that is excepted from required disclosure under [the Act], or other law; and

(3) the identity of the person who made the report.

Law Serv. 1965 and Act of June 3, 2009, 81st Leg., R.S., ch. 1377, § 13, 2009 Tex. Sess. Law Serv. 4324, 4327 (Vernon) (to be codified as amendments to Fam. Code § 261.201). You state the submitted incident report was used or developed in an investigation by the department of alleged child abuse. *See* Fam. Code § 261.001(1) (defining “abuse” for purposes of Fam. Code ch. 261); *see also id.* § 101.003(a) (defining “child” for purposes of this section as person under 18 years of age who is not and has not been married or who has not had the disabilities of

minority removed for general purposes). Based on your representations and our review, we find the submitted report is generally confidential under section 261.201 of the Family Code.

However, the requestor is a parent of the child victim listed in the report, and the parent is not alleged to have committed the alleged abuse. In this instance, the department may not use section 261.201(a) to withhold this report from this requestor. *Id.* § 261.201(k). Section 261.201(1)(3), however, states the identity of the reporting party must be withheld. *Id.* § 261.201(1)(3). Thus, the department must withhold the marked identifying information of the reporting party under section 552.101 of the Government Code in conjunction with section 261.201(1)(3) of the Family Code. Additionally, section 261.201(1)(2) states any information that is excepted from required disclosure under the Act or other law may still be withheld from disclosure. *Id.* § 261.201(1)(2). We note some of the remaining information may be excepted from public disclosure under section 552.130 of the Government Code.¹ Accordingly, we will address the applicability of section 552.130 to the remaining information.

Section 552.130 of the Government Code provides that information relating to a motor vehicle title or registration issued by a Texas agency is excepted from public release. Gov't Code § 552.130(a)(2). We have marked a Texas license plate number that is generally protected by section 552.130. We note, however, section 552.130 protects privacy interests. In this instance, it is not clear whether the marked license plate number belongs to the requestor or another individual. If the license plate number belongs to the requestor, then she has a right of access to the marked information under section 552.023 of the Government Code, and the information may not be withheld under section 552.130. *Id.* § 552.023(b) (governmental body may not deny access to person or person's representative to whom information relates on grounds information is considered confidential under privacy principles). If the marked license plate number does not belong to the requestor, then the information must be withheld under section 552.130 of the Government Code.

In summary, the department must withhold the marked identifying information of the reporting party under section 552.101 of the Government Code in conjunction with section 261.201(1)(3) of the Family Code. If the marked Texas license plate number does not belong to the requestor, the marked information must be withheld under section 552.130 of the Government Code. The remaining information must be released to this requestor.²

¹The Office of the Attorney General will raise a mandatory exception on behalf of a governmental body, but ordinarily will not raise other exceptions. *See* Open Records Decision Nos. 481 (1987), 480 (1987), 470 (1987).

²Because the requestor has a right of access to certain information that otherwise would be excepted from release under the Act, the department must again seek a decision from this office if it receives a request for this information from a different requestor.

This letter ruling is limited to the particular information at issue in this request and limited to the facts as presented to us; therefore, this ruling must not be relied upon as a previous determination regarding any other information or any other circumstances.

This ruling triggers important deadlines regarding the rights and responsibilities of the governmental body and of the requestor.
