Dear Mr. Griffith:

You ask whether certain information is subject to required public disclosure under the Public Information Act (the "Act"), chapter 552 of the Government Code. Your request was assigned ID# 413577 (ORR# 10-3340).

The McKinney Police Department (the "department"), which you represent, received a request for specified crime reporting data for a specified time period. You state you have released most of the requested information. You claim that a portion of the submitted information is excepted from disclosure under section 552.101 of the Government Code. We have considered the exception you claim and reviewed the submitted information.

Section 552.101 of the Government Code excepts from disclosure "information considered to be confidential by law, either constitutional, statutory, or by judicial decision." Gov't Code § 552.101. This exception encompasses the doctrine of common-law privacy, which protects information that (1) contains highly intimate or embarrassing facts, the publication of which would be highly objectionable to a reasonable person, and (2) is not of legitimate concern to the public. *Indus. Found. v. Tex. Indus. Accident Bd.*, 540 S.W.2d 668, 685 (Tex.1976). To demonstrate the applicability of common-law privacy, both prongs of this test must be established. *Id.* at 681-82. In Open Records Decision No. 393 (1983), this office concluded information that either identifies or tends to identify the victim of sexual assault or other sex-related offense must be withheld under common-law privacy. Open Records Decision No. 393 at 2 (1983); *see* Open Records Decision No. 339 (1982); *see also Morales v. Ellen*, 840 S.W.2d 519 (Tex. App.—El Paso 1992, writ denied) (identity of witnesses to and victims of sexual harassment was highly intimate or embarrassing

information and public did not have a legitimate interest in such information). You state a portion of the submitted information "pinpoints exact addresses where sexual assaults occurred within the City [of McKinney]." However, you do not explain, nor can we discern, how releasing the location of the crimes identifies the alleged sexual assault victims. Thus, this information may not be withheld under section 552.101 of the Government Code in conjunction with common-law privacy. As you claim no other exceptions to disclosure for this information, it must be released.

This letter ruling is limited to the particular information at issue in this request and limited to the facts as presented to us; therefore, this ruling must not be relied upon as a previous determination regarding any other information or any other circumstances.
