Dear Ms. Russell:

You ask whether certain information is subject to required public disclosure under the Public Information Act (the "Act"), chapter 552 of the Government Code. Your request was assigned ID# 612430.

The Town of Flower Mound (the "town"), which you represent, received a request for information pertaining to a specified police report. You state the town will redact certain information pursuant to Open Records Decision No. 684 (2009), section 552.130(c) of the Government Code, and section 552.147(b) of the Government Code.<sup>1</sup> You claim some of the submitted information is excepted from disclosure under section 552.1085 of the Government Code. We have considered the exception you claim and reviewed the submitted information.

Section 552.1085 of the Government Code provides, in relevant part, the following:

(c) A sensitive crime scene image in the custody of a governmental body is confidential and excepted from the requirements of Section 552.021 and a

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<sup>1</sup>Open Records Decision No. 684 serves as a previous determination to all governmental bodies authorizing them to withhold certain categories of information without the necessity of seeking a decision from the attorney general. *See* ORD 684. Section 552.130(c) of the Government Code allows a governmental body to redact the information described in subsection 552.130(a) without the necessity of seeking a decision from the attorney general. *See* Gov't Code § 552.130(c). If a governmental body redacts such information, it must notify the requestor in accordance with section 552.130(e). *See id.* § 552.130(d), (e). Section 552.147(b) of the Government Code authorizes a governmental body to redact a living person's social security number from public release without the necessity of requesting a decision from this office. *See id.* § 552.147(b).

governmental body may not permit a person to view or copy the image except as provided by this section. This section applies to any sensitive crime scene image regardless of the date that the image was taken or recorded.

Gov't Code § 552.1085(c). For purposes of section 552.1085, "sensitive crime scene image" means "a photograph or video recording taken at a crime scene, contained in or part of a closed criminal case, that depicts a deceased person in a state of dismemberment, decapitation, or similar mutilation or that depicts the deceased person's genitalia." *See id.* § 552.1085(a)(6). Upon review, we find none of the submitted photographs consist of sensitive crime scene images for the purposes of section 552.1085. Accordingly, the town may not withhold the submitted photographs under section 552.1085(c) of the Government Code.

Section 552.136 of the Government Code provides, "[n]otwithstanding any other provision of [the Act], a credit card, debit card, charge card, or access device number that is collected, assembled, or maintained by or for a governmental body is confidential."<sup>2</sup> *Id.* § 552.136(b); *see id.* § 552.136(a) (defining "access device"). We note the purpose of section 552.136 is to protect the privacy interests of individuals. Thus, because "the right of privacy is purely personal," that right "terminates upon the death of the person whose privacy is invaded," account information that pertains solely to a deceased individual may not be withheld under section 552.136. *See Moore v. Charles B. Pierce Film Enters., Inc.*, 589 S.W.2d 489, 491 (Tex. Civ. App.— Texarkana 1979, writ ref'd n.r.e.); *see also* Attorney General Opinions JM-229 (1984) ("the right of privacy lapses upon death"), H-917 (1976) ("We are . . . of the opinion that the Texas courts would follow the almost uniform rule of other jurisdictions that the right of privacy lapses upon death."); Open Records Decision No. 272 (1981) ("the right of privacy is personal and lapses upon death"). We have indicated information generally subject to section 552.136. However, we note the information we have indicated consists of account numbers and an insurance policy number which belong to a deceased individual. To the extent the information we have indicated pertains to accounts in which any living individual has an interest, the town must withhold such information under section 552.136 of the Government Code. However, if the information we have marked pertains solely to the deceased individual, the town may not withhold it under section 552.136 of the Government Code. The town must release the remaining information.

This letter ruling is limited to the particular information at issue in this request and limited to the facts as presented to us; therefore, this ruling must not be relied upon as a previous determination regarding any other information or any other circumstances.

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<sup>2</sup>The Office of the Attorney General will raise a mandatory exception on behalf of a governmental body, but ordinarily will not raise other exceptions. Open Records Decision Nos. 481(1987), 480(1987), 470 (1987).
